

AIR CADET REPORT

A little history of the 3 Air Cadet Squadrons 434 Wing Supports

Port Colborne's Air Cadet Squadron, 79 Lynton Davies Squadron is one of the original squadrons formed in Canada during 1942, (January 9th, 1942) and has recently celebrated its 77th anniversary. 79 Squadron is currently meeting at Oakwood School on Omar St. on Tuesday nights. 79 Sqn takes its name from Lynton Davies, one of the first men from Port Colborne to join the RAF in WWII. The current Commanding Officer is Captain Belansky. 79 Squadron is sponsored by a Committee of parents and other volunteers. Since September, 79 Squadron has held Tag Day, and a Field Training Exercise (FTX) at which survival, camp craft and canoeing were taught. Like the other squadrons, they are doing their mandatory training on their parade night but also have been meeting on Wednesday nights for band practice and drill team practice, and on Monday nights for fitness and sports training. In November 79 Sqn will be participating in a Vigil overnight November 10-11 at Port Colborne and at Wainfleet cenotaphs. In December, 79 Squadron will be participating in the Christmas parade and holding a Christmas party for the cadets.

Welland's Air Cadet Squadron, 87 Eagle, is one of the original squadrons formed in Canada during 1942, and has recently celebrated its 77th anniversary. 87 Squadron meeting on Wednesday nights at the Niagara Central Dorothy Rungeling Airport in Welland Ontario, the 87 Eagle squadron has been training in the airport's former Fire Company #1 meeting place for over 65 years. Literally thousands of young men and women have reaped the many benefits of the Royal Canadian Air Cadet program in the old WWII-era building. Today the building is maintained by the hard work of the cadets, the generous donations of the community, and the time invested by the Squadron Sponsoring Committee and volunteers. The current Commanding Officer is Capt Bowman. So far this year the Squadron has held an Open House, and tagging. 87 Sqn will be hosting a Halloween party at the Lake St Armouries for all of the 9 Squadrons in Niagara Air Group (NAG) on Nov 1, 2019. In December, they will be having a Christmas Party.

Dunnville's Air Cadet Squadron was reformed on January 20, 1984. 611 Squadron celebrated their 35th anniversary in the past training year. 611 Squadron meet on Tuesday nights at the Dunnville Legion on Queen St. Branch 142 has been the sponsor of the Squadron since 1984. 611 Squadron is active in the community. The current Commanding Officer is Capt Scott Durwood.

All 3 Squadrons will be participating in Poppying for their local Legion on Nov 2nd or 9th, and the Remembrance day Services on Nov 3rd or 11th. On Nov 23 and 30th, there will be a joint training day for the all senior cadets to participate in. Cadets from all squadrons are participating in Ground School in preparation for writing the Glider and Power Scholarship exams in January 2020. The cadets are also preparing for the NAG Sports competition which will be held at the end of January 2020. Also note, that all squadrons will be selling tickets for a chance to win 2 Subaru vehicles, a Lancaster flight for 4, or cash prizes of \$5,000 and \$1,000. The Return of the Propeller Driven Combat Aircraft

The Super Tucano is a light attack aircraft currently being employed by 44 air forces in the world. In a partnership between Sierra Nevada Corp and Embraer, the aircraft is also being built in the USA in Jacksonville, Florida for the Afghan Airforce and an order was recently received to build the aircraft for the Nigerian Air Force from Jacksonville.

The Super Tucano is an economical aircraft to fly and sustain, costing approximately US \$1,000 per hour to fly. Fuel consumption is also a fraction of that used for jet fighters.

Comparative costs for jet fighters as of 2015 are:



Embraer A-29 Super Tucano

F-35A	\$28,455 per hour
F-22 Raptor	\$35,538 per hour
F-18F Super Hornet	\$10,507 per hour

Members of the US Congress have expressed a desire to see expanded use of light attack aircraft (LAA). So far, the US Department of Defense is still looking at the feasibility of purchasing the Super Tucano for US forces. The US Department of Defense Fiscal Year 2020 Budget Request makes no mention of the LAA but does contain a statement, *“Reflected in the FY 2020 request, is a revised Tactical Air (TACAIR) strategy to supplement 5th generation fighters like the F-22 and F-35 with 4th generation capability, to more economically address threats that do not require state-of-the-art 5th generation combat jets.”* Clearly there is a recognition that more economical aircraft must be employed where practical.

Airwomen in Combat

Ace Fighter Pilot Lydia (Lilya) Litviak, HSU (Hero of the Soviet Union)

First woman in history to shoot down an enemy aircraft in aerial combat

More documented kills than any other female fighter pilot in history

Born: August 18, 1921, Moscow

When the first Soviet air show was held on August 18, 1933, the day of Lydia's 12th birthday, she took it as a sign that she definitely was meant to be a pilot flying in the air show from the Central Moscow Aerodrome. Persistent and determined, she persuaded officials at her local flying club to allow her to attend classes at 14 years of age (minimum age was 16). Telling her mother (her father "disappeared" during Stalin's Great Purge) that she was off to rehearsals for a play at school, she attended classes at flying school and passed the theoretical exam. Then it was flying lessons in a U-2 (Po2) biplane. One day in 1936 her instructor asked her if she wanted to fly solo to which she replied "of course" and off she went, solo at 15 years of age. At 18 she attended Kherson Aviation School and worked as a licensed instructor pilot at Kirov Airclub in Moscow.



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On October 8, 1941 the Government requested the creation of the 122 Aviation Group to be headed by the famous Soviet air heroine Marina Raskova, to train and process women into operational groups. Upon interviewing volunteer Lydia, Marina saw her as a fighter pilot. Marina created three all women regiments: the 586th Fighter Aviation Regiment, the 587th Bomber Aviation Regiment and the 588th Night Bomber Aviation Regiment (the famous "Night Witches"). Lydia was placed in the 586th Regiment where she piloted one of the new Yak-1 fighter planes.

In September 1942 Lydia with three of her fellow pilots were transferred to the 437 Fighter Regiment, a men's regiment fighting over Stalingrad. Three days after arriving, flying as a wingman to the regimental commander, she shot down a Junkers JU-88 making her the first woman fighter pilot to shoot down an enemy aircraft. About 10 minutes later she shot down a Bf 109 piloted by an 11-kill fighter ace and three time recipient of the Iron Cross. The German pilot bailed out and was captured. He refused to believe that he had been shot down by a 20-year old girl until Lydia was brought before him and she recounted the details of their encounter. After a short time, the women were transferred to the 9th Guards Fighter Regiment in the Stalingrad area and from there Lydia was transferred to the 296th Fighter Regiment (later the 73rd Guards Fighter Aviation Regiment). One problem was that the Regiments were not equipped to service the Yak-1 and hence they kept moving to where the planes could be serviced.

On February 23, 1943, Lydia was awarded the Order of the Red Star, made a junior lieutenant and selected to be a Free Hunter, where skilled pilots are allowed to search for targets on their own initiative. On June 13, 1943 Lydia was appointed Flight Commander of the 3rd Aviation Squadron within the 73rd Guards Fighter Aviation Regiment.

On August 1, 1943 Lydia was attacking a group of German bombers when she in turn was attacked by Messerschmitt 109s flying cover for the bombers. She was last seen with smoke pouring from her Yak-1b and being pursued by eight Bf 109s. She did not return to her base at Krasny Luch that day and no one knew what happened to her. Her rank at this time was Senior Lieutenant.

Lydia was never forgotten and after a determined 36 year search, remains were located and confirmed to be those of Lydia Litviak. A monument was erected in Krasny Luch in her honour and she was reinterred near the monument. She had set her plane down not far from the village of Marinkova in the Donetsk region and had died in her cockpit. In 1990 she was posthumously named a Hero of the Soviet Union by Soviet Chairman Mikhail Gorbachev. The Lilia Litviak Museum is maintained in Krasny Luch together with the Lilia Litviak High School named in her honour.

Lydia Litviak was attractive, determined, aggressive and a rebel, all of which give rise to fascinating stories. Several books have been written about her and each author has their own version and interpretation of events in Lydia's life and her demise but no matter which one you chose to read it will prove to be exciting and hard to put down.

Canada became the first country to allow women to fly in a combat role since WW2 when the Soviet Union allowed women such as Lydia Litviak to fly in combat missions. In 1989 Captain Jane Foster and Major Deanna Brasseur became the only airwomen in the world flying fighters in operational squadrons.
